1. All submissions shall be in English.
2. Footnotes should not be used in blog pieces: instead, they should link relevant sources in the text, and thereafter detail the same as Endnotes in Oxford style of referencing.
3. Footnotes should be used in article pieces and conform to the Oxford style of referencing.

In making a submission, authors agree to the following:

- That the submitted piece constitutes their own original work and adheres to the OFLS Research Integrity Statement published on our website.
- They consent to the publication of the submitted piece on the OFLS website and associated social media channels,
- They consent that editorial changes may be applied to submissions and accepts that the Associate Editor and President, at all times, retain discretion in determining whether a submission shall be published.
